Cite & Release Program Q3 Report January – March 2020

Overview

This report outlines the enforcement activity related to the SAPD enhanced Cite and Release program, which began on July 1, 2019. The period covered by this report is January 1, 2020 through March 31, 2020. This program authorizes SAPD Officers to issue citations in lieu of custodial arrest in certain Class A or B misdemeanor offenses codified within Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 14.06 (c) and (d). The SAPD amended existing departmental policy and expanded officer discretion to support the enhanced cite and release opportunities. However, in consultation with the Bexar County District Attorney's Office, the Class A and B misdemeanor offense of Penal Code 28.08 Graffiti was excluded from the authority to cite and release. The offenses authorized for cite and release under the enhanced SAPD program is as follows:

- 1. Class B Possession of Marijuana (0-2 oz.)
- 2. Class A Possession of Marijuana (2-4 oz.)
- 3. Class B Possession of Substance in Penalty Group 2-A (0-2 oz.) *E.g. Synthetic cannabinoids*
- 4. Class A Possession of Substance in Penalty Group 2-A (2-4 oz.) E.g. Synthetic cannabinoids
- 5. Class B Criminal Mischief (\$100 or over and less than \$750)

 E.g. damaged property, broken windows, flattened tires
- 6. Class B Theft from businesses (\$100 or over and less than \$750) E.g. shoplifting, retail theft
- 7. Class B Theft of Service (\$100 or over and less than \$750) E.g. non-payment of tab or check, rental fee
- 8. Class B Contraband in a Correctional Facility
 E.g. alcohol, controlled substance, deadly weapon, tobacco products
- 9. Driving While License Invalid

In an effort to evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation of the enhanced Cite and Release Program and to provide the community with information on the program, the Department will produce a quarterly report providing information on the following:


- 1. Enforcement Activity
- 2. Race/Ethnicity
- 3. Age
- 4. Gender
- 5. Location
- 6. Offense Type
- 7. Arrest Reason
- 8. Officer Availability

Additionally, this report builds upon previous quarterly reports and compares data related to the above categories to ensure the program is achieving its goal of reducing officer time spent on calls and is applied in a fair and impartial manner.

1) Enforcement

During the period of January through March 2020, the SAPD arrested 1,654 individuals for eligible offenses, via either custodial arrest or issuing a misdemeanor citation. This represents a decrease of 96 arrests via custodial arrest or citation as compared to the previous quarter total of 1,750 arrests. Figure

1.1 identifies the year to date enforcement activity by type of arrest. To date, the SAPD has performed 3,230 custodial arrests which represents approximately 64% of the enforcement activity for eligible offenses. This is consistent with the custodial arrest rate in the previous quarters. Similarly, the SAPD released 1,798 individuals via misdemeanor citation and 50 individuals via other forms of release year to date. The citation release rate year to date is 36% of the enforcement activity. Other forms of release include: medical, emergency detention and public intoxication.



2) Race/Ethnicity

Table 2.1 identifies the percentage of arrestees (arrests and citations) by race or ethnicity during the Q3 and compares these rates to the rates YTD. In Q3, African Americans represented 16.3% of the total arrests which represents a slight increase (1.8%) from the 14.5% arrest rate observed in previous quarters.

Hispanic arrests in Q3 were down approximately 1.5% at 68.1% as compared to 69.6% in previous quarters. Whites accounted for 14.3% of the arrests in Q3 and is a slight decrease (0.8%) from the arrest rate for Whites of 15.1% for previous quarters. Overall the enforcement activity in Q3 for the eligible offenses appears to be consistent with the enforcement activity during the previous quarters.

Table 2.2 identifies the number of arrestees either arrested via custodial arrest or released by race or ethnicity during the identified period in 2020. With respect to African American arrestees, 99 of the 268 individuals were released which represents an approximate 37% release rate. The data related to Hispanic arrestees demonstrates 408 individuals were released out of 1,114 total arrestees. This represents an approximate 37% release rate among Hispanic arrestees.

In Q3, 99 whites were released out of 247 arrestees. This represents an approximate 40% release rate among white arrestees. The data demonstrates there is not a large disparity by race or ethnicity with respect to the decision to release as opposed to custodial arrest.

3) Age

Table 3.1 identifies the Q3

arrestees with respect to the age of the arrestee. This data demonstrates that approximately 1,371 or 82.9% of the 1,654 total arrestees were 40 years old or younger which is a slight decrease from previous quarters

when 83.2% of arrestees were 40 years old or younger. This trend is consistent with other general crime trends where those engaged in crime tend to be younger as opposed to older.

4) Gender

Table 4.1 identifies the number of arrestees based on gender in Q3. The data demonstrates that in Q3 74.3% of the arrestees were male while 25.7% were female. The release rate for male arrestees is 35.5% which is a slight increase from the 34.9% male release rate in previous quarters. The release for females in Q3 is 42.8% which is an increase of the release rate of 33.3% in previous quarters.

5) Location

Table 5.1 identifies enforcement activity by location within the applicable SAPD Service Area. The number of arrests (custodial and citation release) range from a low of 174 arrests in the Prue Service Area to a high of 363 arrests in the West Service Area. The SAPD Service Area with the lowest citation rate was the Central Service Area at 32.2% and the highest citation rate was 45.7% in the West Service Area.

6) Offense Type

Table 6.1 identifies the enforcement activity by offense and the associated release rate via citation. Class B Theft and Class B Possession of Marijuana are the offenses that generate the majority of enforcement activity at 85% of the arrests combined. Class B Theft has a higher citation release rate at approximately

51% as compared to the release rate of approximately 38% for Possession of Marijuana 0-2 oz. The lowest citation release rate is Class B Criminal Mischief at approximately 9%.



7) Custodial Arrest Reason

The reason officers effect a custodial arrest can vary widely and current SAPD policy identifies certain circumstances where a custodial arrest is required. Figure 7.1 identifies the reason for officers effecting a custodial arrest. The majority of the instances where a custodial arrest was made was due to the individual either being charged with violation(s) beyond the offenses eligible for cite and release and the arrestee having an existing arrest warrant at approximately 91% combined which represents a 5% increase from Q2. In both of these circumstances a custodial arrest is likely required by current SAPD policy as the additional charge and/or warrant require the custodial arrest. Similarly, intoxication and mental health issues that increase the likelihood for self-harm is also likely to require a custodial arrest and accounts for approximately 2% of custodial arrests. Other custodial arrest reasons where the officer may affect a custodial arrest at less than 1% are the arrestee having insufficient identification, being suspected of other criminal behavior and not being a resident of Bexar County.

8) Officer Availability


Table 8.1 identifies the crimes with the highest citation rate and the associated average time savings as compared to custodial arrest times for those crimes. The total reduction in time spent on these crimes was 1,113.5 hours during the three months. Based on full-time equivalent (FTE) analysis, this reduction results in officer time on call savings equivalent to 2.7 FTE during the three-month period which is equal to the savings realized in Q2. Since the implementation of the program there has been a total FTE savings of 2.7 officers.


