- August/September 2022: City Council approved implementation plans, competitive solicitation scope of work and scoring criteria recommended by Council Committees
- January 2023: Staff recommendations presented today reflect City Council approved scope of work and scoring criteria
- February 2, 2023: City Council considers staff recommendations

#### **Nonprofit Social Services (Phase II)**

- Address decreased economic security for residents
- Mitigate increased financial hardship and infrastructure needs for nonprofit organizations impacted by COVID 19



#### **Senior Services (Older Adults)**

- Mitigate increased social isolation for older adults disproportionately impacted by COVID-19
- Address increased older adult food & resource insecurity exacerbated by COVID-19
- Address increased responsibility on informal & unpaid caregivers during the COVID-19 pandemic

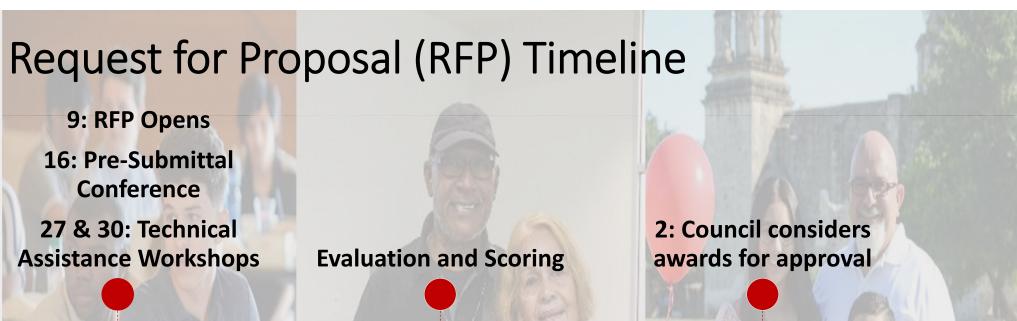

#### **Mental Health Implementation Plan**

- Youth: Address increased social isolation, anxiety, depression, & suicide in school age youth
- Older Adults: Address increased social isolation, anxiety, & depression for older adults
- Homeless: Address increased homeless population with mental health & substance abuse
- Collaboration: Address behavioral health problems in Bexar County where COVID-19 has exacerbated existing conditions

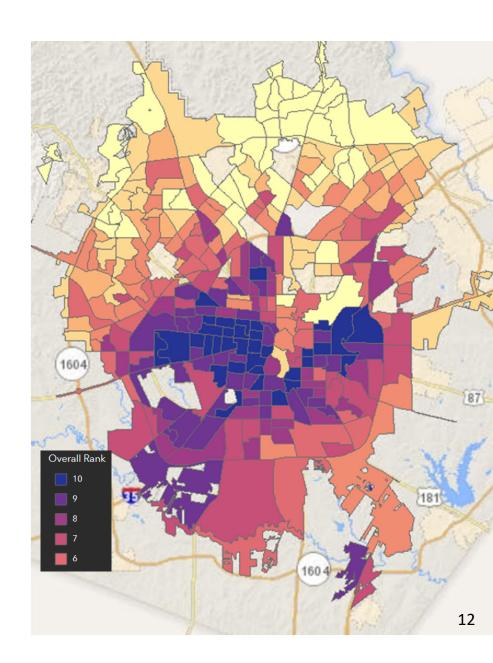
