


## Metro Health Budget History (\$ in Millions)





### **Comprehensive Budget Review: Recommendations**

#### Right-size budgets & positions with current spending - \$2.2 Million

Reduce line-item budgets to reflect current spending (\$1.2 million)

 Contracts and advertising budgets no longer needed or underutilized to reflect actual spending across divisions

Eliminate Paid Sick Leave Program Budget (\$627,715)

Program ordinance deemed unenforceable by court ruling. Reduces 4 positions.

Right-Size Operations (\$356,910)

Reduce 4 administrative positions no longer needed due to savings identified

#### Reduce duplicative program - \$296,919

#### **Unlocked Program**

 Services will continue through Bexar County Re-entry Center and three local nonprofits connect recently released Bexar County incarcerated detainees to social services. Reduces 4 positions.

### **Comprehensive Budget Review: Recommendations**


#### Realign Programs and Staff- \$1.9 Million

- 1) Move Project Worth program to Department of Human Services (DHS) Youth Success Division (\$453,648)
- Improve youth experience through a holistic, streamlined approach; more cost-effective youth programming exists in DHS. Eliminates 3 positions.
- 2) Realign Office of Health Equity (\$69,110) Reduce duplication with Compliance and Opportunity Access Office
- 3) Streamline Trauma-Informed Care Training (\$285,779) Remaining staff to support the certification process for COSA departments. Eliminates 1 position.
- 4) Streamline Por Vida (\$246,839)

certification. Eliminates 4 positions.

- Staff will continue support of 25 partner restaurants; more cost-effective community nutrition programs exist within COSA. Eliminates 2 positions.
- 5) Transition Community Health Worker Resource Hub (\$813,028) Funding remains to support CHW capacity-building with contract with SA Area Foundation. Continuing education credits provided for free by four local/online providers, and Alamo Colleges offers affordable

## Communicable Disease Control

Monitor, investigate & control disease outbreaks



#### **Communicable Disease Prevention**

- Monitor the health status of Bexar County through notifiable conditions surveillance.
- Will complete at least **22,500** infectious disease investigations within 30 days of a public health notification.

#### **Immunizations**

- Collaborate with community stakeholders to improve vaccination coverage.
- Metro Health's Immunizations program will administer at least 10,000 vaccines.

#### **Laboratory Services**

• Conduct at least 120,000 lab tests and serve as regional lab for biological & high consequence infectious diseases testing.

## Chronic Disease & Injury Prevention

Promote healthy lifestyles; reduce risk factors that contribute to chronic disease or injury



#### **Diabetes Prevention**

- Metro Health will conduct free diabetes prevention and self-management workshops in areas with highest diabetes burden.
- 20% of participants completing a diabetes self-management program will indicate an improvement in their confidence to manage their diabetes.

#### **Domestic Violence Prevention**

 11,500 (68%) of domestic violence survivors referred by SAPD will accept services from Metro Health Domestic Violence programs.

#### **Violence Prevention**

1,160 (75%) of community member encounters will accept support services from the Stand Up SA program.

## **Environmental Public Health**

Address environmental hazards; conduct required inspections



#### Food Safety & Regulation

- Metro Health will continue to provide food safety education to ensure compliance and resolution.
- Will conduct at least 39,100 food safety and public swimming pool inspections.

#### **Vector-Borne Surveillance**

Metro Health's Vector Control team will collect at least 644
 Mosquito samples for West Nile Virus disease surveillance.

#### **Air Quality & Pollution Control**

 Per City Ordinance, at least 1,617 businesses will register with Metro Health's Air Pollution Control Program.

## Maternal, Child & Family Health

Promote early interventions and health screenings to support lifelong well-being



#### Women, Infants, & Children (WIC)

 36,924 individuals will receive WIC education and nutrition services.

#### **Oral Health Services**

 Metro Health will administer 20,000 dental exams and/or fluoride treatments to school-aged participants.

#### **Child Abuse Prevention**

 650 individuals will complete Metro Health's Level 2 & 3 Triple P parenting course.

## **Linkages to Clinical Care**

Improve equitable access to healthcare and social services



#### **Mental Health & Public Safety**

• 2,600 of 911 mental health calls the SA-CORE Team responds to will be referred to follow up services.

#### **Behavioral Health**

 250 school-based clients will receive four or more counseling sessions.

#### **Childhood Asthma Prevention**

 76% of SA Kids BREATHE participants with poorly controlled asthma will move to well-controlled asthma or maintained wellcontrolled asthma by third home visit.

### **FY26 Food Establishment Fees**

- Food Establishment Fees updated in accordance with State Law passed in 89<sup>th</sup> Session
  - Beginning on December 1 food establishment fees assessed based on gross volume of food sales (includes food establishments and retail food store with limited open handling):

### FY26 Food Establishment Fee Implementation

#### Fee Schedule Implementation

- September 2025: Request City Council Approval New Fee Schedule Ordinance
- December 1, 2025: Effective Ordinance Date

#### **Educational Campaign**

- September November 2025
  - Email/mail letters to food establishments and schools located in the City of San Antonio
  - Coordinate stakeholder meetings
  - Environmental Health Officers will provide educational materials to area businesses.
  - Social media campaign to increase awareness
